How Denver Compares in Recycling

Eco-Cycle compared Denver to nine U.S. cities that also run their own trash, recycling and composting services. We found Denver lags behind its peer cities in many aspects of recycling, including:

- Current recycling rate
- Financial incentives to reduce waste (pay-as-you-throw and user fees)
- Participation in recycling programs
- Organics collection services
- Regulations on businesses and multi-family units
- Diversion goal

How CO Cities Handle Trash and Recycling Services

Denver is one of only five cities in Colorado that provides trash, recycling and compost services with city-run trucks and crew.

There are four ways a city can be involved with residential trash and recycling services:

Municipally-run trash and recycling services are rare in Colorado, but across the country, more than half of major U.S. cities provide municipally-run trash services to residents.

This means Denver's system is not what's holding the city back in improving its recycling rate. These comparable cities are showing Denver can greatly improve its recycling programs to help mitigate climate change and create green jobs.
